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

### Message from the National Chaplain

Tuesday, January 24, is the Memorial of Saint Francis de Sales, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. To mark the 400th anniversary of the saint's death on December 28, 1622, Pope Francis last month issued the apostolic letter Totum Amoris Est (Everything is Love). One hundred years ago this month Pope Pius XI (1922-1939) commemorated the 300th anniversary of the saint's death with the papal encyclical Disturbance of All Things (Rerum omnium perturbationem). What follows is a summary of what Pius wrote.



The encyclical begins with Pius referring to an encyclical he issued just one month earlier, the Peace of Christ in the Kingdom of Christ. He mentions a key point -- the necessity for all to turn their hearts from the things of this passing world to

those that last forever. This is the purpose for the teachings and ministry of the church. By means of the teachings of the church and her ministry she hope to call all society back to the ways of Christ.

The command of Christ to be holy is not the exclusive prevue of just a few; the law of holiness is for everyone, without exception.

The pope names saints recently canonized by the church -- Ignatius Loyola, Francis Xavier, Philip Neri, and Teresa of Jesus -- as inspirations for people to model their own hearts and mindsets in the ways of holiness. To this list of saints to be admired and imitated he adds the Bishop of Geneva and Doctor of the Universal Church, Francis de Sales.

Saint Francis de Sales is praised for being a strong voice against the heretical teachings of the Protestant Reformation. He affirmed that genuine and true sanctity and holiness is not just the purview of the few who have taken religious vows and live in convents or monasteries, but is possible and can be achieved by all people, regardless of one's state of life.

Pius then gives a brief biography of Francis de Sales, noting the aspects of his personality that led him to be a model of holiness. Francis was friendly, meek, compassionate, and kind-hearted. At the same time, Pius also notes Francis angered easily and said the saint found success in working on controlling his anger.

The pope comments on the spiritual writings of the saint, writings that offer a "sure and easy path to Christian perfection." Two of Francis' best known books are Philothea – An Introduction to the Devout Life and The Treatise on the Love of God.

Saint Francis de Sales shows in the first book that a life of holiness is possible in every way of life in the secular world. He tells how a person can save one's soul by living one's life in a manner that is free from the spirit of the world. One pleases God by doing the things of everyday life correctly.

Once he describes how one is to turn away from sin, win the battles against temptation, and avoid all unnecessary and harmful actions, Francis goes on to teach pious practices that helps one's soul to grow and how it is possible for a person to be one with God. He suggests each person choose one particular virtue and continually practice it to the point of mastering it. Other items of interest he expounds upon include individual virtues, modesty, proper language, fidelity to God, and the duties of husbands, wives, widows, and young women.

An Introduction to the Devout Life concludes with instructions on how one is to conquer temptations and the allurements of earthly pleasures, and also the importance of making an annual renewal of commitment to love God with all one's mind, heart and soul.

The Treatise on the Love of God gives a history of God's love and offers ways for a person to develop and grow in God's love.

Pius writes of the efforts of the saint to win back people who abandoned the Catholic faith due to the Protestant Reformation. After much prayer and fasting, and without food

or money, Francis traveled on foot to Geneva with one travelling companion. When people initially ignored his talks pointing out errors in matters of faith taught them by the Reformers, Francis resorted to writing them on several loose leaflets, hoping they would eventually fall into the right hands. Pius describes Francis' writing style that identified the errors of the Reformers as elegant, polished, and charitable.

Francis' plan worked. The frequency of these leaflets gradually decreased and were eventually discontinued as more and more came to hear Francis preach. Pius XI says that the leaflets were lost for a time after the saint's death, but were later discovered, collected, and given to Pope Alexander VII (1655-1667).

Pope Pius XI called for the world's bishops to implement a commemoration of the tercentenary of the death of Saint Francis de Sales within their dioceses.

Bishops are to publicize and explain this encyclical throughout 1923, up to December 28, the actual date of the saint's death in 1622. They are to instruct the faithful in the doctrines taught and virtues lived by Saint Francis, especially meekness. Particular attention is given to efforts for the faithful to begin anew the practice of virtues and obligations proper to their state of life, a practice with the help of God's grace is possible for everyone.

Francis' books, writings, and sermons serve as an inspiration for people to develop and maintain a spiritual piety and so are to be made available to a wide an audience as possible.

Also, bishops are instructed to have every parish in their dioceses conduct a triduum or a novena sometime during 1923, up to December 28, so that the faithful can be exposed to the ways of holiness and instructed in the truths of faith taught by St. Francis de Sales. Anyone who participates in any function honoring St. Francis de Sales during this year of jubilee could receive a partial indulgence. Pius granted a plenary indulgence for participation on the last day of the triduum or novena or any other day chosen.

Pius XI expresses his hope that the tercentennial observance of the death of Saint Francis de Sales will inspire Catholic journalists and writers to explain, spread, and defend Church teachings with the same charity that characterized the works of the saint. He then uses his Apostolic authority in this encyclical to declare Saint Francis de Sales, Doctor of the Church, the Heavenly Patron of All Writers

Pius XI concludes by asking his brother bishops to ask their people to pray to Saint Francis de Sales for him.

### The Patroness of Slovakia on the New Vatican Postage Stamp

The Vatican philatelic edition for 2022 includes a postage stamp dedicated to the three apostolic journeys undertaken by Pope Francis in the past year. The graphic composition, with a scene of the Pope embracing refugees sailing in a boat and the symbol of the ancient ziggurat, is dominated by the patron saint of Slovakia, the Virgin Mary of the Seven Sorrows of Saštín.

Three apostolic journeys took Pope Francis to Iraq in March (5-8), to the International Eucharistic Congress in Budapest and Slovakia in September (12-15), and to Cyprus and Greece in December (2-6).

### Slovak Ambassador Visits Pittsburgh

# Pope Francis Received the President of the Slovak Republic Zuzana Čaputová

On Saturday, December 10, 2022, the Holy Father Francis received the President of the Slovak Republic Zuzana Čaputová with her entourage in the Apostolic Palace of the Slovak Republic. The meeting took place in the library hall, where the Pope usually receives the heads of state.

The audience with the Pope lasted 45 minutes. The Holy Father welcomed Mrs. Zuzana Čaputová and held a private interview with her. This was followed by a presentation of members of the delegation with an exchange of photos and an exchange of gifts.

The Slovak President then met in the premises of the State Secretariat with Mons. Paul Richard Gallagher, the Vatican Secretary for Relations with the States and International Organizations.

President Zuzana Čaputová gave Pope Francis an image of St. Francis of Assisi by the academic artist Dorota Sadovská, traditional hand-made glass Christmas decorations from the Okrasa team in Čadca, and festive pastry from the Bivio Company in Bratislava on a wicker tray from its workshop Vrbovnica in Bardejov.

The Slovak President also brought as gifts for the Holy Father two publications: the illustrated book "Pope Francis" from the publishing house of Nové Mesto with illustrations by Eva Šimonová, and the biographical work of "Silvo Krčméry" on a prominent personality "Inconspicuous heroes".

#### Visit to the Slovak Institute in Rome

President Zuzana Čaputová visited the Papal Slovak Institute and the College of Saints Cyril and Methodius, where she met with Slovaks working in various church institutions in Rome. Rector College Father Pavol Zvara, who presented the President of the College and other members of the Slovak Community in Rome, also welcomed the Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Slovak Republic Rastislav Káčer and the Ambassador of the Slovak Republic at the Holy See of Marek Lisanský.

President Caputová spoke after the rector's introduction. In her speech, she highlighted the historical importance of the Slovak Institute of Saints Cyril and Methodius as an "island of freedom", and recalled the personality of the recently deceased Cardinal Jozef Tomko. She stated that the institution today still plays important cultural, spiritual, and educational roles.

The President also spoke about the importance of the messages of Pope Francis about solidarity, respect, and unification, especially now, when in addition to global challenges, Slovakia also faces difficult divisions in society. At the same time, she appreciated the wave of solidarity with refugees from Ukraine, as many spiritual or religious Sisters were on the front lines to offer assistance to refugees.

Predseda NR SR Boris Kollár (Sme rodina) po hlasovaní prerušil schôdzu do piatka (16. 12.) do 9.00 h. Oznámil, že s premiérom pôjdu k prezidentke Zuzane Čaputovej. V piatok sa nebude hlasovať, najbližšie hlasovanie bude podľa jeho slov v utorok (20. 12.). "Pokračujeme ďalej v schôdzi národnej rady, nepadol parlament, padla vláda," povedal Kollár. Zároveň médiám povedal, že je za predčasné voľby, ktoré by sa podľa neho mohli konať v máji či júni.

Líder SaS Richard Sulík v pléne počas diskusie uviedol, že si vie po páde vlády predstaviť jej riadnu a zmysluplnú rekonštrukciu. V takom prípade by SaS kabinet podporila, no nebola by jeho súčasťou. Hovoril aj o možnosti predčasných volieb či úradníckej vlády.

V pléne vystúpili aj viacerí členovia vlády a premiér. Návrh SaS odmietali. Liberálov vyzvali, aby urobili krok späť. Argumentovali zachovaním demokratickej vlády a upozorňovali na riziká návratu Smeru-SD a Hlasu-SD.

### The Parliament Has Expressed No Confidence In The Government

The motion of no confidence in the government was submitted by the opposition SaS party. Nonaligned MPs around Petr Pellegrini also signed the motion to convene an extraordinary session.

Bratislava, December 15 (TASR) - On Thursday, the National Council of the Slovak Republic (NC SR) voted no confidence in the government of Eduard Heger (OĽANO). 78 out of 102 MPs present voted for the fall of the government, 20 were against, two abstained, and two did not vote. Before the vote, the OĽANO MPs left the chamber.

After the vote, the President of the National Assembly Boris Kollár (Sme rodina) adjourned the sitting until Friday (16 December) at 9.00 a.m. He announced that he and the Prime Minister would go to President Zuzana Čaputová. He said there would be no vote on Friday and the next vote would be on Tuesday (20 December). "We are continuing the National Council session, the parliament has not fallen, the government has fallen," Kollár said. He also told the media that he was in favor of early elections, which he said could be held in May or June.

The motion of no confidence in the government was supported by Smer-SD and SaS MPs, as well as Martin Borgula, Patrick Linhart, Ján Krošlák and opposition non-attached MPs, with the exception of Miroslav Kollár and Martin Klus. Martin Čepček and Romana Tabák (Sme rodina) abstained.

On Thursday, Finance Minister Igor Matovič (OĽANO) offered his resignation if SaS withdrew its signatures from the motion for a vote of no confidence and supported the budget.

The motion of no confidence in the government was submitted by the opposition SaS. Non-attached MPs around Petr Pellegrini have also signed the motion for an extraordinary session.

SaS leader Richard Sulík said in the plenary during the debate that he could imagine a proper and meaningful reconstruction of the government after its collapse. In such a case, SaS would support the cabinet, but would not be part of it. He also spoke about the possibility of early elections or a caretaker government.

Several members of the government and the prime minister also spoke at the plenary. They rejected the SaS proposal. They called on the Liberals to take a step back. They argued for the preservation of democratic government and warned of the risks of a return of Smer-SD and Voice-SD.

## **Branch 746 celebrates**

October 16, 2022 marked the centennial anniversary of Branch 746 - St. John the Baptist Society of Linden, New Jersey! To celebrate, Branch 746 organized a gala evening with over 140 guests in attendance. The main centerpiece of the evening was the impeccably preserved 100 year-old original Branch Charter which resides at the rectory of Holy Family Church.

The evening began with Holy Mass celebrated by the Pastor of Slovak Holy Family Roman Catholic Church, Fr. Mariusz Luksza, for the intention of the branch and its members. The liturgy was followed by a gala dinner at Msgr. Komar Hall which commenced with a bountiful cocktail hour an assortment of finger foods, shrimp cocktail, fruits, including tradition Slovak open-faced sandwiches called chliebicky. The event was catered by Julie Rada and family and dinner included Slovak specialties such as holupky and segeninsky gulas and knedliky.

The rich program commenced with singing of the National Anthems of the US, Canada, and the Slovak Republic by renowned Broadway star, Luba Mason, member of Branch 716. The invocation was offered by FCSU National Chaplain Fr. Thomas Nasta in English and Fr. Roman Palecko of Branch 746 in Slovak.

H.E. Permanent Representative of the Slovak Republic to the United Nations, Michal Mlynar offered the toast and congratulated the Branch on its centennial anniversary noting the significance of this milestone for the Slovak community and encouraged members to continue to preserve the vision of the founder, Fr. Furdek. Having two daughters' members of Branch 746, Ambassador Mlynar spoke to the important need for youth engagement and the role they play in preserving FCSU for future generations.

In her opening remarks, Region 1 Director, Sabina Sabados, spoke to the legacy of Branch 746 members that played a pivotal role in building the Slovak church in Linden. ### Sister Felicita Stofko

Born in Široká, Slovakia, Anna Stofko immigrated to Reading, PA as a young adult and lived there with her brother. On August 5, 1924, when she was 25, she entered the SS-CMs at Villa Sacred Heart. Her pastor at Saints Cyril and Methodius Church commended her for the good example she had displayed as a laywoman. She had given evidence of humility, peacefulness and fervor in the house of God. How much more would virtue flower in the religious community she planned to enter? And flower it did. In the twenty years of religious life Sister Felicita served as a dedicated homemaker and cook in nine different local convents. Sister Felicita, however, is remembered by the Sisters in her "band" as being a faithful religious. Since she was older than most of them, she had the reputation of being motherly and approachable, also sensible, caring, kind and helpful.

Besides being an excellent cook she was an expert dressmaker. She liked to surprise the Sisters in the convents to which she was assigned by making their clothes disappear from the wash and reappear on their beds, beautifully and skillfully mended.

In June 1926, the Sisters at Villa Sacred Heart were delighted with the visit of four Bishops from Slovakia. They came there on their way to the Eucharistic Congress in Chicago and were at the first graduation. The delegation from Slovak included the following bishops: Marian Blaha of Banská Bystrica, Jan Vojtaššák from Spiš, Pavol Jantausch of Trnava, and Bishop Jozef Čarsky from Košice. One of the novices knew Bishop Čársky. He had been her pastor in Slovakia. Sister Felicita, a novice at the time, was particularly happy to see Bishop Čarsky who had once been her pastor.

Twenty-two years after her entrance into religious life, Sister Felicita was stationed at Jednota where she was suddenly taken in death. It was October 17, 1946.

### Nuncius Girasoli v slovenskom kolégiu v Ríme: Nielen veriaci, ale vierohodní

Pápežské slovenské kolégium sv. Cyrila a Metoda v Ríme navštívil v utorok 15. novembra apoštolský nuncius v Slovenskej republike Mons. Nicola Girasoli. Zoznámil sa so životom kolégia a slávil svätú omšu spolu so slovenskými kňazmi, rehoľnými sestrami a laikmi pôsobiacimi vo. Večnom meste. V homílii povzbudil v prvom rade k intenzívnej práci na budovaní a obnove vierohodnosti Cirkvi.

Rektor kolégia Pavol Zvara medzi prítomnými osobitne privítal veľvyslanca SR pri Svätej stolici Mareka Lisánskeho, pracovníkov Slovenského historického ústavu v Ríme, ako aj dvojicu amerických kňazov so slovenskými koreňmi, ktorí sú práve na návšteve Večného mesta: Robert Siffrin je predsedom Konferencie slovenského kléru v USA a Peter Polando je kaplánom Ženskej slovenskej katolíckej jednoty a bývalým predsedom Združenia slovenských katolíkov v USA. V úvodnom slove rektor Zvara pripomenul aj pamiatku nedávno zosnulého kardinála Jozefa Tomka.

Pri svojom prvom stretnutí so slovenskou komunitou v Ríme sa nový nuncius najprv podelil s tým, ako po príchode do Bratislavy postupne absolvoval zdvorilostné návštevy, pri ktorých zakaždým dostal otázku, s akou agendou prichádza:

"Ako nuncius nemám program, nemám agendu, mojím programom je evanjelium, slovo, ktoré nám Pán zanechal. Poslanie a služba nuncia je jednota, kráčať spoločne ako Cirkev, s biskupmi, kňazmi, rehoľníkmi, rehoľníčkami, s Božím ľudom," uviedol 65-ročný Mons. Nicola Girasoli, ktorého Svätý Otec vymenoval za nuncia na Slovensku 2. júla.

"To, čo dnes potrebujeme, je nielen byť veriacimi. Pápež František nám to neustále opakuje: musíme byť vierohodnými. Vierohodnosť je veľmi dôležitá. Potrebujeme byť nielen veriaci, ale vierohodní. ... Musíme preto kráčať spolu, a nikto sa nesmie cítiť vylúčený, nikto sa nesmie považovať za lepšieho ako ten druhý..."

Ohlasovanie evanjelia sa musí prejavovať slovami premietanými do skutkov. Vierohodné gestá vyvolávajú radosť a oduševnenie, zdôraznil nuncius a pripomenul niektoré momenty návštevy pápeža Františka na Slovensku, osobitne medzi mladými v Košiciach a na sídlisku Luník. Odporúčal vracať sa k príhovorom Svätého Otca z návštevy Slovenska, ktoré obsahujú dôležité podnety.

V súvislosti s pastoračným prístupom pápeža Františka si Mons. Girasoli zaspomínal aj na svoje niekdajšie diplomatické pôsobenie v Argentíne. Rodák z juhotalianskej oblasti Bari pri homílii hovoril v taliančine, no prítomných ubezpečil, že sa už začal učiť slovenčinu, aby mohol čoskoro sláviť eucharistiu zo slovenských liturgických kníh. Pri pohostení kapustnicou, o ktoré sa postarala domáca komunita Milosrdných sestier sv. Vincenta – satmárok, sa apoštolský nuncius spontánne prejavil už aj niekoľkými slovenskými výrazmi.

### The Apostolic Nuncio Girasoli at the Slovak College in Rome: Not Only Faithful, but Credible

The Apostolic Nuncio to the Slovak Republic, Mons. Nicola Girasoli visited the Pontifical Slovak College of Sts. Cyril and Methodius in Rome on Tuesday, November 15, 2022. He learned about the life of the College and celebrated Holy Mass together with Slovak priests, religious sisters, and lay people working at the College in the Eternal City. In his homily, he encouraged the clergy to work intensively to build and renew the credibility of the Church.

The Rector of the College, Pavol Zvara, welcomed those present, which included the Ambassador of the Slovak Republic to the Holy See, Marek Lisánský, the staff of the Slovak Historical Institute in Rome, as well as two American priests with Slovak roots who are currently visiting the Eternal City: Robert Siffrin is the President of the Conference of Slovak Clergy in the USA (founded in 1985 to associate priests and deacons in the United States, who are of Slovak ancestry, and to assist those preparing themselves for priestly ministry for the Roman Catholic Church in Slovakia [Kopanic]), and Peter Polando is the chaplain of the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Union and the former President of Slovak Catholic Federation in the USA. In his opening remarks, Rector Zvara also recalled the recently deceased

#### Cardinal Jozef Tomko.

In his first meeting with the Slovak community in Rome, the new nuncio first shared how, after his arrival in Bratislava, he made successive courtesy visits, each time being asked what kind of agenda he had. He responded: "As a nuncio, I have no agenda, I have no agenda, my agenda is the Gospel, the word that the Lord has left us. The mission and ministry of the nuncio is unity, to walk together as a Church, with the bishops, priests, religious men and women, with the people of God," said the 65-year-old Msgr. Nicola Girasoli, whom the Holy Father appointed nuncio to Slovakia on July 2, [2022].

"What we need today is not only to be believers. Pope Francis keeps telling us: we need to be faithful. Credibility is very important. We need not only to be believers, but to be credible. ... We must therefore walk together, and no one must feel excluded, no one must consider himself better than the other..."

The proclamation of the Gospel must be manifested in words translated into deeds. Credible gestures evoke joy and soulfulness, the nuncio stressed, recalling some moments of Pope Francis' visit to Slovakia, especially among the young people in Košice and in the Lunik housing development. He recommended returning to the Holy Father's speeches from his visit to Slovakia, which contain important messages.

In the context of Pope Francis' pastoral approach, Msgr. Girasoli also recalled his former diplomatic assignment in Argentina. The native of the southern Italian region of Bari spoke in Italian during his homily, but he assured those present that he had already begun to learn Slovak so that he could soon celebrate the Eucharist in the Slovak liturgy. While they were treated with kapustnica (Slovak sour cabbage soup with klobása), which was provided by the local community of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent – Satmarians, the Apostolic Nuncio spontaneously even spoke a few Slovak expressions.

### LIGHT ONE CANDLE Don't Give Darkness Power Over Light

In my previous column, I shared parts of my interview with Joy Marie Clarkson, author of the book "Aggressively Happy: A Realist's Guide to Believing in the Goodness of Life." She revealed how a period of suffering led her closer to God and a greater appreciation for the joys we can experience if we open ourselves to them. But getting to that point was not a straight line for Joy, who admits she has struggled with doubt as well.

She doesn't see doubt as a bad thing, though, noting that she feels a kinship to two characters in Dostoevsky's novel "The Brothers Karamazov" because "it portrays someone who, with the best intentions of their heart, cannot believe in God—and someone who, with the best of intentions of their heart, chooses to [believe] anyway. I always have felt like I had both of those within me. A part of choosing to believe... is saying that my life is more sensible, more endurable in faith—and the consolation that comes with faith can't come from the outside. I have to take the step into faith to be able to receive its consolations. Having that story in my mind has helped me know that God is faithful to me even when I waver in doubt."

Among the consolations of looking at life through the eyes of faith is the belief "that at the heart of reality is goodness, is joy, and that in choosing to cultivate happiness, we are speaking to that reality." Still, there are people who view the world through a darker lens, seeing only its hardships and sufferings. While acknowledging that we can't be happy all the time, Joy believes that view gives the darkness too much power over the light.

She explained, "There's a great quote by Jack Gilbert, the American poet, who says, 'To only attend to evil would be to praise the devil.' So, attend to what is good and beautiful and true, but not in a way that ignores all the difficult things of life...There can be this idea that if...someone in the world is suffering, you're being selfish because you're being happy...It's like, 'If I'm sitting around being cynical and unhappy, I'm more righteous than everybody else because I'm more knowing.' When in fact, you're probably making life for everyone around you more unpleasant. It's not helping anyone on the other side of the world, it's not helping anyone around you, and it's not being attuned and thankful for what is in front of you."

When Joy encounters problems nowadays, she tries to follow The Christophers' approach of lighting a candle rather than cursing the darkness. She concluded, "I always start with the practical...What I try to do is I... eat something healthy, I'm going to sometimes literally light a candle. It's amazing to me how much pleasure...lighting a candle can be. Then...I try to be intentional about reaching out to friends. Sometimes when I'm encountering difficulties, trying to give kindness to other people helps me feel better, because it also reminds me that I'm not just a victim to the rest of life. I can be an agent of positivity.

"Then, I [rest] in God. There are times for shaking one's fist at God and doing all the Psalmist activities. But I think also [about] trusting in God's love for me, no matter what happens. Sometimes that takes the form of prayers and listening to a beautiful song and knowing that God made beautiful things in the world."

### Kissell Family Dedicates Scholarship to Service Learning

A priest at Saint Vincent changed the course of Thomas Kissell's life, something he has never forgotten.

The son of a coal miner/farmer father and a homemaker from United, Kissell, C'51, had never been beyond Greensburg until he joined the Navy in 1943 at age 17. After serving for 27 months in the Pacific Theater, and an honorable discharge, he returned home. He obtained a job at Jeannette Tire and Rubber, but when the company began layoffs, as one of the recent hires, he lost his job. He made plans to go to school in Hershey to train for the Pennsylvania State Police, and even had a letter of recommendation from his pastor. However, when the time came for him to leave, his pastor, Rev. Louis Hohos, would not let him go.



"He said to me, 'you're going to Saint Vincent,'" Kissell recalled. He called Father Edmund Cuneo, O.S.B., the dean, but the dean responded that not only was there no room, but there was a waiting list in the hundreds. The pastor did not give up, Kissell said, telling the dean "When you needed money for the college, Tommy Kissell went door to door to solicit funds for you. He didn't turn you down.' I was enrolled."

Kissell went to work before he went to school, however, getting up at 2 a.m. to tend to a coke oven in United, and finishing at 6 a.m. He even had energy left for the baseball team until the sport was discontinued at the end of his sophomore year. The Navy veteran married Helen Whisdosh while still in school, and they had two of their ten children before he obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in education.

Over his long career in education, he has been an English teacher at Hurst High School, an evening school instructor at Saint Vincent, supervising principal in the Unity Township and then the Unity-Youngstown Joint School District, assistant superintendent and then superintendent of the Greater Latrobe School District, and superintendent of the Penn Cambria School District. He retired in 1986.

Just as important as his work and his family, was—and is—giving back. During his career and in retirement, he has served with dozens of professional, community, and church organizations. Since retirement, he continues involvement with his church—Saint Cecilia in Whitney—and with other organizations such as serving on the board of Overly's Country Christmas and with the Westmoreland County Chapter of the Pennsylvania Association of School Retirees. He has received the Letterman of Distinction Award and Alumnus of Distinction Award from Saint Vincent College, where over the years he has been involved with the Alumni Council, the Drug and Alcohol Primary Prevention Program, Vocational Educational Programming, and the Letterman's Club.

Thus, a few years ago, when the ten Kissell children and their children wanted to do something to honor their parents, they looked at the couple's life of service and established the Helen and Tom Kissell Endowed Scholarship for Service Learning at Saint Vincent College.

"There is no question that Saint Vincent is special to both of my parents," said Helen Kissell Burns. "We wanted to recognize something that was important to them. So my siblings and I decided to establish a scholarship in their honor."

The Kissells' ten children include Helen Burns, Paulette Stratico, Darlene Kimmel, Don, Kathryn Mitchell, Cindy Hoffman, Annette Mowery, Jennifer Strayer, Kevin, and the late Dr. Thomas X. Kissell. Two of the Kissells' 25 grandchildren have attended Saint Vincent, the daughters of Helen and Gerald Burns: Jodi C. Kraisinger, C'91, and Courtney Marie Burns, C'03.

During a recent afternoon visit, the Kissells displayed the "surprise" letter they received in 2007 from then-President Jim Towey announcing the gift of the scholarship, as well as thank-you notes written by several students who have benefited from the scholarship in the past few years.

The first award helped pay travel costs for a student to go to Brazil where she spent a week working with AIDS patients. The most recent stipend went to a student who worked with the poor in Nicaragua.

"Our children know how I feel about Saint Vincent. They know my heart's there," Kissell said. The scholarship is a way of keeping it there."

Tom Kissell was member of Branch 181 United, PA. He helped his father pull coke before going to St. Vincent College. Tom told me he would study for tests by asking himself a question when taking the coal up the ramp and he would need to answer the question before returning the wheelbarrow for more coal. Once he was finished, he would hitch hike to school as he did not own a car.

In the Navy he started out serving as a cook and used many of his mother's Slovak recipes. This brought much satisfaction to the crew and assisted in his promotion.

Tom was one of the first public school superintendents in an era where there was prejudice against Catholic's serving in the public school system. When I was in eighth grade, we were not permitted to play in the WPIAL, we had to play in the Pittsburgh Catholic League. **Submitted by Greg Maurer, FCSU Chairman of Auditors**



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### The Testimony of Slovak-Americans: the Spiritual Roots and Personality of Cardinal Tomko

The article addresses the impact of Cardinal Jozef Tomko and the long-term relationship of Slovak-Americans with the Pontifical Slovak Institute and the College of St. Cyril and Methodius in Rome. It includes interviews with two priests of the Diocese of Youngstown, Ohio, Mons. Robert Siffrin and Msgr. Peter Polando.

Msgr. Robert J. Siffrin is the chairman of the Conference of Slovak Clergy in the USA. Msgr. Peter M. Polando is the chaplain of the First Slovak Women's Catholic Unity in the USA and former president of the Association of Slovak Catholics in the USA. During their visit to Rome in November 2022, Fr. Jozef Bartkovjak SJ, head of the Slovak editorial office of Vatican Radio-Vatican News, recorded an interview recorded in English and the Vatican website translated it into Slovak.

Welcome to the Slovak department of the Vatican Radio. Msgr. Siffrin, you are not in Rome for the first time, nor are you, Mons. Poland, you are frequent guests in Rome and Slovakia. I know that you both attended the funeral of Cardinal Jozef Tomko in Košice in August. Share with us your impressions and your long-term friendly re-

lationship with the late Cardinal Tomko.

Msgr. Siffrin: The funeral in Košice was a wonderful tribute to Cardinal Tomko. I have a warm relationship and deep admiration for his service in the Church, for his work in the field of missions all over the world and for his great love for Slovakia. How many times did he share how much his faith was rooted in the heritage of his fathers and he lovingly brought it to others. So it was really beneficial to participate in his funeral in Košice, to show a warm tribute to his life and his love for the Church.

Msgr. Polando, you visited Cardinal Tomko in Rome several times in the past. These days you came again to a place that reminds us of him, how do you feel here?

Msgr. Polando: Indeed, we have really known Cardinal Tomek in Youngstown, Ohio for many years. Already in the 60s and 70s of the last century, when Father George Franco was the administrator of the parish of the Church of the Most Holy Name of Jesus, he used to visit him, and that's when I met Father Tomko for the first time. And then, when he became a cardinal, he also invited us to his house for dinner, and it was wonderful to be there with him. Ever since we came to Rome, with Mons. Siffrin, and also with my mother, if he knew we were in town, he always invited us for dinner and had great conversations with us about what he was doing in the world, in the field of evangelism, and also about his personal life.

Now you are staying in Rome for several days and have the opportunity to participate in various events. Could you mention some of them?

Msgr. Siffrin: It was a wonderful coincidence that we could be here in Rome for the anniversary celebration at the Slovak Institute and for the presentation of the jubilee publication. It is a beautiful way to share the good news of the faith and to honor and continue to pass on the Slovak Catholic heritage to the Church. It was truly an amazing honor to be a part of those celebrations.

How do you perceive your Slovak roots within your Catholic identity? You live in the United States, you are members of the Diocese of Youngstown, Ohio. How do the people there view it?

Msgr. Polando: It's something natural for me, because I have 100% Slovak roots from both sides of my parents. My grandparents emigrated from Slovakia to the United States at a young age, 15 to 20 years old. You know, sometimes we don't like our 15 or 20-year-olds going abroad, but it was a challenge for them. And the people coming from Slovakia to America helped build America into what it is today. They found work there, but they were hard working laborers. They worked in coal mines in Pennsylvania, in steel mills in Ohio or in Gary, Indiana... And that taught us honest hard work. Grandparents were not educated at that time because they left school and came to work and start a family. They had big families in those days - I have a lot of aunts and uncles, you can verify that. And this work ethic was then reflected in education. My parents were already able to go to schools, high school, and they allowed me and my siblings to go to college. And now we are the ones helping to build America in a different way.

Msgr. Siffrin, you are the chairman of the Conference of Slovak Clergy in the USA, an organization with historical roots. Could you introduce her in a few words?

Mons. Siffrin: The Conference of Slovak Clergy was founded in 1985. Slovak clergy have been involved in brotherhoods for many years. The Slovak Clergy Conference wants to keep the faith alive. That is why we value our heritage, which is very important and is an integral part of our Catholic identity. The clergy are also very supportive of higher studies here in Rome; several colleges and institutes were funded by the Americans back in the 1960s. We continue to fund the colleges today, to run them and to support the studying priests who come from Slovakia so that they can grow educationally and bring the skills they have acquired back to Slovakia. There are about 75 of us, we meet every other year for joint spiritual events, and we are also all involved in various Slovak fraternities to encourage faith in the Church and to maintain the heritage of Slovak history in our parishes and families.

On 15 November, a ceremony was held at the Pontifical Slovak College of Sts. Cyril and Methodius in Rome to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the first visit of Pope St. John Paul II to this place. The visit was a recognition of this Slovak institution during the times of communism, when there was no freedom in Slovakia. Did you have the opportunity to meet John Paul II in person back then in 1981?

Mons. Polando: Not directly in 1981, but I met St. John Paul II later. There were five Slovak priests and one bishop in our group. They had five special chairs for us in the basilica and the Pope gave his weekly address and then came up to us to greet us. And so he met first with Bishop Adamec and then with three or four other monsignors, and I was just an ordinary priest. And the Pope comes to me and asks, "Where is your purple?" And I said: "Holy Father, only you can give me the purple." So the next Palm Sunday I became a monsignor. That's how I conversed with His Holiness. This is my remembrance of St. John Paul II and it was a wonderful occasion, I felt extremely honored at that time.

And you, Mons. Siffrin, did you meet St. John Paul II in person?

Yes, I met the Holy Father once.

But I was ordained a deacon the year he was elected, so my whole priesthood has been influenced by the witness, the teaching and the holiness of his life, it really inspired me as a young priest to continue to strive for this heroic virtue, to fulfill what I had committed myself to. He always challenged us to not be afraid to live our faith and to witness to the world the love of Jesus Christ.

Slovak organizations in the U.S. are in an odd situation because the younger generation no longer speaks Slovak, but their Slovak roots are clear. Mons. Polando, you are currently the chaplain of the First Slovak Women's Catholic Unity in the USA. How do you manage to maintain traditions without speaking Slovak?

All Slovak associations in the United States emphasize Slovak traditions. We have dancers in traditional costumes who are involved in dancing, and we have musicians who are involved. But the associations are in different chapters all over the United States. The First Catholic Ladies Assoiciation, of which I am chaplain, is present in 48 of the 50 states in the United States. So we try to maintain Slovak traditions, but we also help those people who are less fortunate than we are, because what we get, we try to give back to others, and not only to

Slovaks, but to other peoples as well.

What remains in your memories of the personality of the recently deceased Cardinal Jozef Tomek?

Mons. Siffrin: The occasions of visits to Cardinal Tomek were always a testimony on his part of a great enthusiasm for the life of the Church, a great desire to know what was going on, what people were thinking. He was a great storyteller and gave a wonderful testimony of sharing faith in different parts of the world and of understanding how differences in cultures can enrich us and broaden our search for Truth. I will always remember the long conversations we had, learning more about the world and especially about the challenges the Church faces in various missions around the world.

Mons. Polando: I still remember him as a priest. Father Tomko came to Youngstown when I was in elementary school, and our pastor brought him to all the classes so we could meet him. He came from here, from Rome, it was when communism was still alive. And later, it was a great honor and privilege, when I was a priest and pastor of one of our Slovak parishes in Youngstown, he decided to come and stay with us and celebrate as a cardinal a Holy Mass in Slovak, which everyone was thrilled about. And that's my real memory of him, that he always held on to his heritage, his Slovak heritage, and always reminded us to be good, holy Catholics.

At this year's celebration of the 40th anniversary of the first papal visit to the Slovak Institute in Rome, it was mentioned that the contribution of the Catholics from the United States, the Slovaks who helped build the College, is something that is etched in memory and people are grateful for. Anyone who comes to see the college, the chapel of St Cyril and Methodius, the mosaics and this beautiful place will realize that this is the contribution of 'American Slovaks'. Do you have an emotional attachment to this place in Rome?

Mons. Siffrin: I have been to the Slovak Institute about ten times. The Conference of Slovak Clergy helps to keep the functioning of the College in the awareness of all members. And also our continued support, as we have come to realize that the studies that young priests undertake here in Rome provide a wealth of knowledge and experience for ministry in the various dioceses in Slovakia. And as part of this, I have also invited to Youngstown four theologians of Slovak nationality, future priests, so that we are enriched by their ministry. We have a connection with what is happening especially in Eastern Slovakia, in the Archdiocese of Košice. I have been there 25 times. To see that living Church in the men and women and priests and religious, it was just an amazing experience.

And you, Mons. Polando, your first memory of the Slovak Institute?

The first one is from my childhood. Because among our envelopes of alms that our parents gave in church at collection time, there were always envelopes for this institute once a year. At that time there were about 8 to 10 Slovak parishes within our diocese, all of which worked together, along with other Slovaks, especially in Pennsylvania and Ohio, the states that had the largest Slovak population, to make sure that this institute was built. And it is a miracle even today that we have such a building as we have here in Rome.

To conclude our conversation, as you return to Youngstown, Ohio, what will you share with your parishioners and members of your organizations? What is the main impression you bring with you?

Msgr. Siffrin: Every time I have been to Rome or Slovakia, it has been a wonderful opportunity for me to share the vibrancy of the Church back home in Youngstown. And it helps all of our people of Slovak descent to feel connected to their homeland and to the life of the Church and the support that we provide to help the ministry of the Church in Slovakia to continue to grow and develop.

Mons. Polando: When I first went to Slovakia, it was in 1973 for 35 days. And I met a priest in my grandmother's village who took me to Košice to see the cathedral, but at that time, under communism, they called it a museum. I was amazed at the vibrant Catholic faith of the people in a time of oppression. And I still carry that with me as a priest because they prayed for the local priests, and this was during the communist era. It made me wonder if I shouldn't do the same for my Catholic faith, for my Slovak heritage. And thanks to that, I am the priest I am today for 42 years.

Thank you both very much for your testimonies, for reminding us of things that the younger generation should know and preserve as historical memory. I wish you a safe journey home and perhaps we will see you again in Rome.



### The 32nd Annual Slovak Heritage Festival at the University of Pittsburgh Michael J. Kopanic, Jr., Ph.D., editor

On Sunday, November 6, 2022, the Slovak Studies Program, with the help of generous sponsors, including the First Catholic Slovak Union, hosted the 32nd Annual Slovak Heritage Festival in the Commons Room of the Cathedral of Learning on the University of Pittsburgh campus. After a three-year hiatus due to the covid-19 virus, it was a welcome event to be back in person again to celebration Slovak culture, history, food, crafts, and have opportunities for some education about Slovaks.

In the morning before the festival opened, invited fraternal and local dignitaries met with Radovan Javorčík, Slovakia's ambassador to the USA, before the Slovak Fest in the beautiful historic Crogan-Schenley Ballroom. Ambassador Javorčík opened with a speech about how important the Slovak Program was in teaching the Slovak language and culture and lauded the tradition of carrying on the festival to keep alive traditions.

Honorary Consul and board member of the W. PA Slovak Cultural Assn., Joseph Senko, noted how area Slovak organizations have worked to promote Slovak culture with lectures and annual events such as wine tasting, etc. Each attendee spoke a few words about the Slovak Program, its uniqueness as the only university that regularly taught Slovak, and our need to support it financially and in spirit. My particular concern as an historian was the long-term viability of keeping the Slovak Program going into the distant future, i.e., in hundreds of years. I also suggested that the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, that the institution consider establishing a traveling museum exhibit in areas where more Slovaks live.

Attendees from the University of Pittsburgh included professors from the Center for Russian, East European, and Eurasian Studies and the Slavic Studies Department. Representing the fraternals which helped fund the Slovak Program were Michael Horvath (President, Slovak Catholic Sokol), Cynthia Maleski (President FCSLA), Joseph Stefka, Jr. (President, NSS Life), Dr. Michael J. Kopanic, Jr., Ph.D. (Jednota editor).

#### The Slovak Heritage Festival

At the festival, Larry Kozlowski was kind enough to share his place with the FCSU, so I displayed some handouts, including copies of Jednota, which were quite popular. Larry gave some demonstrations in making oplatky (Christmas wafers) and offered for sale his short book on Slovak Christmas customs. Other interesting booths featured exhibits and materials and books. As at any Slovak gathering, a menu of Slovak foods included halušky, holubky, klobasa, pirohy, and orechový koláč (nut rolls).
